





As we mark the 100th anniversary of The Great Gatsby, F. Scott Fitzgerald's timeless novel continues to captivate readers with its haunting portrayal of the American Dream. First published in 1925, the story of Jay Gatsby's lavish parties, unrelenting longing, and tragic downfall remains a mirror reflecting the hopes, illusions, and disillusionments of a nation. Its lyrical prose, complex characters, and critique of wealth and class have secured its place as one of the most iconic and enduring works in American literature. A century later, The Great Gatsby still speaks to the

heart of what it means to dream.

Published on April 10, 1925, by Charles Scribner's Sons, *The Great Gatsby* has been developed into a variety of forms, including film, television, stage plays, and even graphic novels. There have been four major movie adaptations, along with various television specials, a Broadway musical, and a short film. Additionally, the novel has been translated into at least 42 languages and adapted into various illustrated editions.

# **UPCOMING AT**

# Avenue Auburn



Dr. Keith E. Baird was born in Barbados on January 20, 1923. Baird was raised and lived in Barbados until he came to the United States in 1947 at the age of 24. Once he reached the U.S., Baird enrolled at Columbia University where he studied Spanish. Baird continued his education at Columbia with completed graduate coursework in Romance Philology and Linguistics. Baird finished his education at Union Graduate Institute in Cincinnati Ohio, earning a doctorate in sociolinguistics.

From 1964–1969, Baird served as an educator and administrator in New York City. Baird served as the director of the Afro-American History and Culture Center, in District 29, New York City Board of Education. In this role, he developed educational curricula in Afro-American Studies for elementary and secondary teachers. During this time, Baird also co-founded the community education center in the Ocean Hill-Brownsville Experimental School District.

The majority of Baird's work centered on the view that language can and should be used as a political tool wielded against people of color and that language should also be a tool for liberation and self-development. Baird was one of the first advocates for the use of "Afro American" as opposed to Negro, Colored and other harmful descriptors used to label Black People and people of color. Baird's reasoning for the use of Afro-American was that he believed that using a term that invokes cultural heritage instead of racial trauma would improve the self-esteem of people of color within the Black Diaspora.

This collection will serve as a great resource for aspiring educators focused on Black Studies. Researchers of this collection will discover notable finds such as signed photos, early African American Studies programming, and rare Atlanta history.





Philip G. Freelon (1953-2019) had a remarkable fourdecade architectural career designing public buildings. Inspired by his Harlem Renaissance era artist grandfather Allan Randall Freelon, Philip G. Freelon's creative eye combined his love of math, color and history. Curated by Emily Makas, this exhibition critically examines Freelon's libraries, museums, and other public buildings with a focus on projects that foreground African American culture, communities, and identities. Freelon argued architecture should be more than a container, that it should help tell the story of and be integral to the content of these public institutions. Two Atlanta projects are featured--the National Center for Civil and Human Rights (2014) and the renovation and expansion of the Auburn Avenue Research Library (2016). The CONTAINER/ CONTAINED exhibit was made possible by University of North Carolina Charlotte's Center for Community, Heritage, and The Arts, and the Graham Foundation and will be made available until July 2025.

If you would like to introduce young children to Mr. Freelon's life story, you are welcome to read a copy of Kelly Starling Lyon's picture book, *Dreamer Builder: The Story of Architect Philip Freelon*.
